Student Immunization and Life-Threatening Health Conditions

Certificate of Immunization

Immediately upon enrollment in the district, the student's parent/guardian will complete a Certificate of Immunization Status (CIS), provided by the Washington Department of Health (DOH), or submit a medically verified immunization record. will be completed by the student's parent/guardian. The district will make the eertificate CIS and/or medically verified immunization record will be made a part of the student's permanent record.

If, by the student's first day of enrollment, a student does not have the required immunization documentation for receipt of any or all of the required immunizations, the student's parent/guardian may submit evidence of having initiated an immunization schedule, which he/she will provide the student be placed in a "conditional admittance" status category. Students may attend under conditional status for a limited time. Within thirty (30) calendar days of the student's first day of attendance, the The parent/guardian must provide has no longer than thirty (30) calendar days from the student's first day of attendance to get any missing immunization(s) and/or provide documentation needed to complete the CIS. If a student needs additional doses to complete a vaccine series, he/she the student will remain in conditional admittance status for a maximum of no longer than thirty (30) calendar days after the next dose is due until the series is complete. If a student is granted a temporary medical exemption as recorded on a Certificate of Exemption (COE), the parent/guardian has no longer than thirty (30) calendar days from the expiration of the temporary medical exemption to get any missing immunization(s) and/or provide documentation needed to complete the CIS. Failure to submit documentation within these timelines will be sufficient cause to exclude the student from school.

Exemptions from Immunization

Any and all exemptions will be processed and recorded on a Certificate of Exemption (COE) **form** as provided by the **DOH Washington Department of Health**.

<u>The district will grant</u> <u>E</u>exemptions from one or more vaccines <u>will be granted</u> for <u>a</u> medical reason upon certification by a licensed health care provider <u>(LHCP)</u> that there is a medical reason for not administering the vaccine.

The district will grant Eexemptions for personal, philosophical or religious reasons will be granted upon request of the parent's guardian's submission of a COE form, signed by an LHCP, stating. To request an exemption, a parent or guardian must submit a signed COE that the parent/guardian has either a philosophical, personal, or religious objection to the immunization of the child and the LHCP. Forms must include a statement to be signed by a health care practitioner stating that he or she provided the parent/guardian with information about the benefits and risks of immunization to the child. The LHCP may sign the COE form may be signed by a health care practitioner at any time prior to the district's enrollment of the child in a school or licensed day care. The district will accept a photocopy Photocopies of the signed COE form or a letter from the LHCP health care practitioner will be accepted in lieu of the original form.

If a COE states the Any parent/-or legal-guardian is a member in a religious body or church with beliefs or teachings that preclude a child from receiving medical treatment from a LHCP, the LHCP's signature on the COE form is not required. of the child who exempts the child due to religious beliefs is not required to have a COE signed by a health care practitioner if the parent or legal guardian demonstrates on the COE membership in a religious body or a church in which the religious beliefs or teachings of the church preclude a health care practitioner from providing medical treatment to the child.

The <u>district will mark the</u> permanent file of students <u>who have</u> with exemptions will be marked for easy identification should the local department of health order that exempted students be excluded from school temporarily during an outbreak or an epidemic.

If <u>the district does not receive</u> a <u>COE or CIS</u> <u>certificate of exemption is not received</u> upon the student's enrollment in school, the principal/<u>designee</u> will provide written notice to the parents/<u>or</u>-guardians informing them of:

- A. The immunization requirements;
- B. The potential that the student will be denied denied denial of attendance by the student if any missing immunization(s) and/or unless documentation needed to complete the CIS are not provided within thirty (30) calendar days of the student's first day of attendance;
- C. The procedural due process rights; and
- D. The immunization services **that are** available.

Exclusion from School

Following proper notification, the school will exclude the student for noncompliance with the immunization laws, **subject pursuant** to the appeal **process** procedures for student expulsions (Policy 3323, Long-Term Suspension and Expulsion). This notice will be delivered in person or by certified mail and will be provided to parents/guardians in their native language if feasible.

Parents/guardians have a right to a hearing, provided they notify the school within three (3) business days after receiving the exclusion order from the principal. If the parent/guardian requests a hearing, the district will notify in writing the parent/or guardian and principal will be notified in writing of the time and place for the hearing and will present the case to a hearing officer appointed by the superintendent/or designee.
