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NEW MILEAGE RATE

Effective Jan. 1, the mileage reimbursement rate for miles driven while conducting official district business has increased to 58 cents per mile. This is a 3.5 cent increase from the prior rate. Additionally, the mileage chart (located in the <u>Business Information Manual</u>) now includes the new elementary school, Tambark Creek, noticed as "TC." Miles traveled within the district will be calculated based on the mileage charge when filling out the paper form. When submitting mileage claims, please separate by year so the separate rates are on separate forms.
