5. Ellison Education Grants for teachers

The <u>Ellison Education Grants</u> were created to provide support to K-12 public school teachers who select and design academic enrichment curriculum for students and or professional learning experiences relevant to their current practice. The Ellison Foundation supports the classroom teacher's expertise in understanding their own professional learning needs and the needs of their students.

The Ellison Foundation will award at least 10 grants ranging between \$2,500 and \$10,000 for the 2019-20 school year. Applications are accepted through March 9.

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1. Encourage high school seniors to apply to National Youth Science Camp

Washington high school seniors are encouraged to submit an application to attend the 2019 National Youth Science Camp (NYSC).

Two Washington high school seniors will be selected from the applicant pool to receive a scholarship to exchange ideas with scientists and other professionals from the academic and corporate worlds. The selected delegates must not only demonstrate academic achievement in science, but also show potential for thoughtful scientific leadership.

Application materials are available on the <u>NYSC website</u> must be submitted by Feb. 28, 2019. Prospective candidates are also encouraged to let OSPI know of their intent to apply by emailing <u>Rachel Farrington</u>.

2. NPR Student Podcast Challenge for students in grades 5 through 12

Students can create their podcast entry in any class or extracurricular group, on any topic. Here are some suggestions from NPR on topics:

- Tell a story about your school or community: about something that happened there — recently or in the past — that your audience should know about.
- What is a moment in history that all students should learn about?
- Show both sides of a debate about an issue that's important to you.

What do you want to change about the world? What's a big change that you want to make in the future?

• Explain something to us that kids understand and grown-ups don't.
