Macaroni Coloring

Ingredients

- Macaroni
- Food coloring
- Small zip lock bags



An easy fun-non-messy way to color macaroni.

In a small bag add 2 handfuls of macaroni and food coloring. Seal the baggie and have a child shake the baggie until the macaroni is colored. Lay out on paper towels to dry. You can glue to paper to make art or make a necklace to wear.

Hair Gel Writing

Need: zip log bag and hair gel

Take a large zip lock bag add the cheapest hair gel you can find and get as much air out as possible. Then seal and tape it shut Remind them they cannot open or pop the bag.

You can practice writing letters, numbers, child's name, shapes or draw a picture.

Goop

1 cup flour

1 cup salt

1 cup water



Mix all ingredients together and stir until well blended. Put goop in empty mustard/ ketchup squeeze bottles. Add food coloring for tint or use tempera paint for strong color tones. Use this mixture to decorate paper or cardboard cutouts of people, eggs, rainbows, etc.

Baker's Clay

1 ½ cup warm water


1 1/2 cup salt

6 tablespoons vegetable oil

Food coloring as desired

5 cups (approx.) flour

Instructions



When finished with mixture, knead approximately 10-15 minutes. Roll clay out to ½ inch to 1 inch thick. Use cookie cutters, rollers or other kitchen gadgets to create shapes and designs. Place on a non-greased or foil-lined cookie sheet. Place in a <u>COLD</u> oven. Set oven on warm (250 degrees) and leave in oven overnight or, if you are in a rush, set the oven to 325 degrees. Pieces should be done in one hour unless they are very thick. Note: Do not attempt to cook clay about 325 degrees; do not attempt to microwave clay.

When pieces are finished baking and cooling, they can be painted with tempera, acrylic, watercolors (not too wet) or colored with felt markers. Spray the finished products with clear acrylic spray and they will last quite a while.



Homemade Sidewalk Chalk

<u>Ingredients</u>

Plaster of Paris (dry powder, not mixed)

Tempera Paint (any colors you like)

Silicon Mold (the kind used for baking; can be found in a variety of shapes) or Empty toilet paper rolls with one end sealed with plastic wrap and tape)

Water

Disposable Cups

Plastic Spoons

Instructions

For each color you will need a separate cup.

Fill each cup with 3/4 cup of water.

Add 1/4 cup of paint

Add 1 cup of Plaster of Paris

Mix well

Pour mixture into molds or toilet paper rolls.

If you want to layer colors just pour the first color in and add the second or third on top (don't mix them)

Let dry for 24 hours. Remove them from the mold (be careful because they are still soft and you need to carefully pop them out). Let them dry outside the molds for an additional 24 hours!



Ice Cream in a Bag

Ingredients

- 1 cup half and half
- 1.5 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tbsp sugar
- ice
- 1/4 cup salt
- Ziploc bags 1 Small, 1 Large



Instructions

- 1. Pour 1 cup of half and half into a small Ziploc bag.
- 2. Add 1.5 teaspoons of vanilla extract and 1 tablespoon of sugar.
- 3. Seal the bag firmly and get any excess air out.
- 4. In the larger Ziploc bag, fill it about 1/2 way with ice. Add 1/4 cup of salt.
- 5. Then add your small bag and fill with extra ice on top. Seal the large bag.
- 6. Get gloves for shaking and shake for 6 minutes. *Gloves are needed since the salt makes the ice extra cold.
- 7. Take the small bag out of the large bag and rinse the outside of the small bag with cold water. Make sure to rinse out the top part of the bag also (above the seal).
- 8. Once done rinsing, carefully open the small bag to not get any remaining salt from the outside of the bag inside the bag.
- 9. The ice cream will be a little icy looking to start. Use a spoon to mix it around and soften it up a bit. Scoop out and enjoy!

Tornado in a Jar

Materials

- A jar (with a lid)
- Dish soap
- Water
- Vinegar
- Measuring spoons

Optional items

- Food coloring
- Iridescent glitter




Directions

- Begin by filling a jar with **cold water**, leaving 1-2 inches from the top. You can use any type of jar as long as it is round and has a lid.
- Add 1-2 drops of food coloring and or glitter if desired
- Add 1 Tablespoon of dish soap a 1 teaspoon of white vinegar
- Mix gently
- Once ingredients are mixed place lid on tightly and you are ready to make your tornado
- Swirl round and round and then stop
- Watch your tornado in a jar
