Plan. As students experience the wide variety of CTE courses available throughout the district, they explore in-demand career pathways and gain real-world skills. They also learn more about themselves.





Vocational education transforms to meet needs of the 21st century

Many of us remember making a cutting board in wood shop or learning to change the oil in auto shop as part of our high school's vocational education program. Vocational education, known as Career and Technical Education (CTE) today, looks a lot different. CTE programs are dynamic and adapt continually to keep pace with industry and workforce demands.

The mission of CTE in Everett Public Schools is to prepare each student with technical, academic and 21st-century skills for success in the workplace and in further education by ensuring all students have opportunities to explore in-demand career pathways and secure good-paying, rewarding careers in the future.

That mission is supported by several initiatives across the district. Building skills for the future begins early, with elementary students encouraged to explore careers and fields of interest. In middle school, students work with their families and school staff to develop their High School and Beyond Plan. Students continue to revise their plan each year as their interests and/or goals change.

In high school, students must enroll in at least two CTE courses to meet graduation requirements. More than 60 CTE-focused courses are available and integrate with six high school career pathways including Engineering & Advanced Manufacturing, Business & Professional Services, Education, Energy & Sustainability, Information & Communication Technology and Health Science & Medical Careers.

Also, the district supports 18 Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO) and robotics clubs in the elementary, middle and high schools. CTSO's are extracurricular groups for students in CTE pathways to further their knowledge and skills by participating in activities, events and competitions. Some example CTSO's are Future Business Leaders of

America (FBLA) and Health Occupations Student Organizations (HOSA).

At Cascade High School, students benefit from hands-on learning and work toward industry certifications in the Core Plus Engineering & Advanced Manufacturing program. Core Plus Aerospace is a manufacturing curriculum that prepares students for high-demand jobs through hands-on learning. Developed and supported by industry leaders like Boeing, Core Plus Aerospace is designed to be delivered in an engaging classroom setting and provide opportunities for students to explore careers in industries that might be of interest.

Certifications include computeraided design (CAD), OSHA-10 Safety, Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) Precision Measurement and more. "At the end of the program students earn Core Plus Certification which applies to many industries across Washington state, said Manufacturing Instructor Pete Smith.

Academics is integrated with hands-on, technical learning, and students earn credit for Algebra II and junior and senior level English. For example, as part of Cascade's Manufacturing pathway, English coursework focuses on industrystyle writing, and students gain experience with SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis, technical and quality assurance writing. "Each of the units we do is built with input from Boeing and other community partners in mind so we can prepare our students for the high level of industry writing they will see in a career," explained English and CTE Instructor Davena Lau.

where they sustain particular weights on their pulley system. In their most recent project, students each built an electric guitar from scratch. They did calculations for fret spacing and studied the math behind sound waves. "We find the applied math in everything we do," shared Youngberg.

Coursework in the Energy & Sustainability pathway includes agriculture, clean energy, sustainable construction, food processing and more. Pathway core course includes Biology and the Environment, AP Environmental Science and Biotechnology. "This set of classes gives kids exposure to environmental sciences, energy and chemistry, and students begin to understand implications for our future and how science can be used for sustainable production of energy as well as food," explained Cascade CTE and Science Teacher Carole Tanner.

Pathway teachers work in partnership with Snohomish County PUD, Snohomish Conservation District and Washington State University, taking kids on field trips to wind farms, local dams, Seattle green built buildings and more. Partners also visit students on campus, engaging in small workshops. Tanner says the pathway is great for students who don't know what they want to do after high school as it gives them pre-requisites to apply to a four-year university and exposes them to industry partners where they may make connections for jobs, internships and apprenticeships.

For students wanting a more defined career focus, school-based Career Preparatory Programs provide industryrecognized skills in four in-demand careers; Advanced Manufacturing & Auto (Cascade High), Patient Care

(Everett High – begins fall 2021), Cybersecurity & Networking (Jackson High) and Early Childhood Education.

The newest program,
Patient Care at Everett
High, begins this fall.
There are many indemand medical jobs
in our area including
medical assisting, radiology,
phlebotomy, nursing and
more. The course takes place

in a newly designed patient care floor at Everett High School.

"The opportunity to learn from experienced nurses, complete 50 hours of clinicals onsite at Providence, receive college credit and earn a certified nursing certificate is an outstanding opportunity for our students. It is truly preparing our students for life after high school and giving them a lifelong advantage," said Mary Ingraham, Everett High assistant principal.

This year the Communications & Information Technology
Pathway at Jackson High School
expanded to include a Cybersecurity
course which allows students the
opportunity to explore that career
path while learning skills and pushing
towards earning the CompTIA Security+
certification. "Students can graduate from
Jackson and enter into a cybersecurity
job making \$50-60,000 right away and
companies will sponsor their further
education," explained Brian Day, director,
STEM – Career & Technical Education.

Although CTE programs in Everett Public Schools are robust, "We are always reviewing our data and looking at how diversity is dispersed across courses," explained Anthony Anderson, Director, CTE & STEM Partnerships and Choice Programs.

Recently the district conducted a Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment to review data, engage stakeholders, review feedback, identify needs and set goals for 2021-22 and beyond.

"We continue to look to expand what we offer our students and provide them with what is current in the market at the time so we evolve with our community and make sure students are ready for the workforce and can earn a sustainable income," shared Anderson. "We are facing a time

Vocational education, known as Career and Technical Education (CTE) today, looks a lot different.

The Early Childhood Education Pathway provides students a route to post-secondary options in education with the hopes that many of our students will return to Everett Public Schools as teachers. There is an emphasis on recruiting diverse students to the program, including bilingual and multilingual students. Webinars are held for the Introduction to Education course at each high school so students can learn more about the program.

Webinars offer students the opportunity to "interact with professionals that look like them, meaning we bring in Black and Indigenous teachers of color who are part of the disability community, LGTBQA+ community, so the students can learn from their experiences navigating the education system, and successfully becoming professionals," explained Education Pathway Program Coordinator Leslie Fernanda Diaz

when our students need critical thinking skills so they know how to repurpose themselves in society when one door closes and another opportunity arises."

Career readiness is an important target for every student in Everett Public Schools. We continually innovate and improve programs to match student needs with opportunities in the workforce. "We are flipping the script on what traditional CTE programs look like," shared Chief Academic Officer Shelley Boten, "there is a lot of enthusiasm and we've got a great team onboard who is really forward-thinking in the service of students."

Early learning programs prepare students for success

In fall 2019, one-third of the children in our region started their first day of kindergarten without the skills and experiences they need for success.

Investing in high-quality early childhood education builds the foundation for future learning, behavior and health. As reported in the State of the Children: Early Learning & Care, Northwest Region, "The 'spillover' effects of investing in children at an early age have been linked to a stronger economy, increased caregiver job stability and a reduction in the cost for special education, healthcare and criminal justice spending later in life."

In Everett Public Schools, the P-3 Early Learning team strives to create safe, healthy, and aligned learning experiences for all children in our community. Work is focused on connecting a child's earliest years at home, or in childcare, to our school and community programs. The goal of the team is the optimum development of the whole child. The district offers two preschool options, Developmental Preschool and the Early Childhood Education & Assistance Program (ECEAP). We also provide Transitional Kindergarten for students who have not had access to an early learning program prior to kindergarten, Play and Learn for families and their children, birth to five years old and Everett Ready, a transition-into-kindergarten program offered in August. This year, because of remote and hybrid learning, we are also offering a first and second grade Jump Start program to support students' transition back to in-person learning.

Developmental Preschool is a program for children ages three to five who have been identified through Child Find as having a developmental delay or disability. The Child Find Team provides free developmental screening and/or special education evaluation for all children ages three to five years suspected of having a developmental

delay or disability and they have an office located at Cascade High School.

ECEAP is a free, comprehensive, preschool program funded by the state of Washington for qualifying children and families that partners with parents to support both student learning and the whole family. There are three main parts to the program:

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Preschool services for three and four-year-old children –

ECEAP focuses on preparing children for kindergarten and success in school using a "whole child" approach. This includes social-emotional skills, language, thinking skills and physical development as well as academic skills such as literacy and mathematics, all of which will help children be prepared for kindergarten. Preschoolers learn through play and interactions, so during class children will have a meal and snack as a group, large group/circle time, small group opportunities, and ample time to make choices about their play, both indoors and out.

Family services –

ECEAP focuses on supporting family stability and connectedness and will work with parents to set goals for their family and provide resources, tools and other support. Parents have opportunities to be involved, learn about topics that interest them and gain support from staff and other families.

Health and nutrition services -

ECEAP focuses on child and family health and wellbeing. Children receive developmental and health screenings and the team works with parents to ensure children have preventative medical and dental care. Health and nutrition activities and education are a regular part of the program for both children and families.

The six ECEAP sites within the Everett School District are Cedar Wood, Garfield, Hawthorne, Lowell, Madison and Silver Lake elementary schools. They serve students all across the district and are enrolling now for fall 2021. To enroll in ECEAP, families must apply and qualify. Eligibility is based on income, family circumstance and environmental or developmental factors. Play and Learn is a free program for families with children birth to five years and is traditionally offered in-person at two sites, Mill Creek City Hall and Everett Public Library. Children attend with their caregiver-parent, grandparent, childcare provider, etc. The program combines a rich, play-based learning experience and parent education. In the current year, Play and Learn is offering a virtual circle time in Spanish and English available on our website at www.everettsd.org/PlayAndLearn and monthly activity kit pick-up at three locations-Everett Public Library, the Evergreen Branch and Mill Creek Library.

Transitional Kindergarten is a program designed to support students in a successful start to kindergarten. The program runs full day from January to June. The locations vary depending on space availability. This year, the program is located at four elementary schools – View Ridge, Monroe, Jefferson and Tambark Creek. Families complete an interest form beginning in November, students are screened in December and January and classes begin in second semester.

The requirements to participate in Transitional Kindergarten include:

- Student lives within the EPS boundaries,
- will be five by August 31 and are attending kindergarten in the fall,
- is not currently enrolled in a preschool program and,
- exhibits a need academic, social emotional or other.

Everett Ready is a transition-intokindergarten program for all enrolled kindergartners. It is scheduled for one week at every elementary school, August 23-27, in the morning. There is not a separate registration process for Everett Ready. If a student is enrolled in kindergarten for September, they are welcome and encouraged to attend Everett Ready. Students will have an opportunity to meet their teachers and peers, become familiar with the school campus, classroom routines and procedures. Transportation is provided. There is a family meeting during the Everett Ready week so the adults in the student's life also have an opportunity to become familiar with their child's school.

Food & Nutrition Services provides free meals

Did you know from September 2020 through March 2021, 1,373,322 meals have been provided at no charge for both students and kids in the community?

Food & Nutrition services is proud to provide free meals for all students regardless of where they are learning. Weekly meal kits are available each Wednesday for all kids if they are learning onsite or at home. Meal kits include breakfast and lunch for five days and include entrees, milk and a variety of fruits and veggies. Elementary students who are learning on site two days a week choose from a selection of cold items that are eaten in the classroom. Secondary students learning onsite have access to both hot and cold choices in the cafeteria. Food & Nutrition will continue to provide free meals through the summer for all kids age 1-18.

Kids in Transition (KIT) Support

KIT supports students without a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. KIT eliminates barriers to students' academic success and extra-curricular participation and can help with things like school supplies, certain fees, and even transportation for eligible students. KIT partners with many community agencies who can help with other resources as well. Last year, over 1,100 eligible students were supported at some time during the school year.

Caring culture

Ian Sturm, a General Education Paraeducator at Whittier Elementary School, experienced firsthand the caring culture at Everett Public Schools. In July 2020, he fell while camping and discovered over the next couple months he broke a vertebra that required surgery. He was surprised to find out the recovery time was expected to take 90 days, 60 of which were workdays and he only had about a third of the time covered with his accrued sick and personal days. The office manager at his school told him about the Shared Sick Leave Program and worked to coordinate sick leave donations from teachers and staff to be directed to his
