

# Education & Training = Earning Potential

Did you know that your earning potential for the future is tied to your education and training after high school?

It pays to continue your education or training!!



## What do These Terms Mean?

Term	Definition
Community College	<u>Two-year Associate Degree</u> programs in academic, scientific, and technical fields.
Technical/Trade College	One-to-two-year <u>programs</u> providing training for skilled, trade and high-tech workers preparing for a career in the high-tech industry.
Associate Degree	A <u>two-year</u> degree earned for an undergraduate course of study.
University	<u>Four-year programs</u> that offer the widest variety of class subjects and levels. Students can earn Bachelor's Degree and advanced degrees in specialized fields.
Bachelor's Degree	An academic degree earned for an undergraduate course of study that normally requires <b>three to five years</b> of coursework.
Masters Degree	An academic degree earned <u>after</u> a Bachelor's Degree in a specific field of study or profession.
Doctorate (PhD)	The highest level of academic degree and can be earned in almost any subject area not just medical fields.
Tuition	The <b>money you pay</b> to take classes in college. In state is less expensive than out of state.
<b>Education and Training</b>	<u>Cost of taking courses</u> to be trained in a specific area and vary by type.

## Money, Money!

**Financial aid** is money that the government and other organizations give or lend to you to pay for education and training.


To qualify for financial aid, you have to apply during your senior year in high school.

# Financial aid comes from these sources:


- Federal government (the largest source)
- State governments
- Colleges and universities
- Private organizations, such as companies, clubs and religious organizations
- Banks and lending companies



## Financial Aid Types

Scholarships are called gift aid because they do not have to be paid back.

A **loan** is when you borrow money from a bank that you <u>do</u> pay back over time.



**Grants** are called **gift aid** because they **do not** have to be paid back.

The Federal Work-Study Program offers paid parttime jobs to help students pay for college costs.

## Are You a College Bound Scholar?

The College Bound Scholarship is an early commitment of state financial aid to eligible students who...

- Sign up in 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> grade
- Fulfill the College Bound pledge

#### What do I get with the scholarship?

Once you apply for financial aid as a **senior** the scholarship will pay the average tuition cost at a public college including some fees and a small book allowance.

#### Where can I use it?

- Public community and technical colleges
- Public four-year colleges and universities
- Independent colleges and universities
- Private career colleges






