

"As Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day approaches, many teachers may be making plans to teach about him and his legacy. It's important to seize the opportunity to teach about his activism and students' own capacity to be change agents. Too often, however,



lesson plans fail to <u>move beyond "I Have a Dream,"</u> to examine King's status as a 'hero' or to acknowledge the depth and complexity of the movement he helped to lead.

Instead of doing the 'same old, same old,' consider a wider range of approaches to teaching about King that will <u>deepen your students' understanding</u> of his legacy and his role in a broad, dynamic movement."

# **Lunar New Year**

"Lunar New Year is one of the most important celebrations of the year among East and Southeast Asian cultures, including Chinese, Vietnamese and Korean communities, among others.



China's Lunar New Year is known as the Spring Festival or *Chūnjié* in Mandarin, while Koreans call it *Seollal* and Vietnamese refer to it as *Têt*. Tied to the lunar calendar, the holiday began as a time for feasting and to honor household and heavenly deities, as well as ancestors."




#### Right to Read Film Screening, January 24, 2024 (FREE)

That's why Oakland-based NAACP activist Kareem Weaver believes literacy is one of the greatest civil rights issues of our time and is fighting for better reading instruction. "What good is winning the right to vote if we can't even read the ballot?" Fed up with the bleak reading scores in his own community, Kareem files a petition with the Oakland Unified School District demanding change.
