McKinney-Vento Eligibility




A more inclusive definition of "homeless"

Children & Youth who lack a <u>fixed, regular, and</u> <u>adequate</u> nighttime residence

"Doubled-up" means sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason.

"Adequate" means the space where the child is sleeping meets the physical and psychological safety needs of the child.







Potential signs of homelessness might include:

- Hearing children or parents talking about having to leave where they are staying, or staying with other people;
- Being in public places during the school day,
- Poor hygiene
- Unmet medical/dental needs (not having Personal Protective Equipment (PPE))
- Wearing the same clothes repeatedly
- Fatigue
- Social and behavioral challenges may include extreme shyness, withdrawal, or aggression; clinginess; difficulty with peer and/or adult relationships; poor attention span; and anxiety late in the school day.



Unaccompanied Homeless Youth (UHY)




















In 2021 the Washington State Legislature passed the *Keeping Families Together Act* in recognition that children and families are best served when children are cared for by their loved ones and in their communities.


The Keeping Families Together Act became effective on July 1, 2023.



Changes to the Shelter Care proceedings (where dependency is/is not established)

- Should result in fewer removals from home
- Increased Kinship placements (vs. Foster homes)
- Reduction of racial disparities

Must show just cause of imminent physical harm to be removed. Not counting inadequate housing, poverty, prenatal drug exposure, mental illness/disability or non-conforming social behavior. Courts will consider what preventative services can be put in place to eliminate removal.



*Child Welfare Agency has PLACEMENT, CARE, & AUTHORITY May also include: Tribal Foster Care & Federal Foster Care

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Every school district is required to designate a Foster Care Liaison.

Students remain in school of origin unless there is a determination that it is not in their best interest.

Students in foster care are entitled to immediate enrollment, even without documents normally required.

Schools/OSPI must collaborate with Child Welfare Agencies.

Foster Care Liaison Duties

Make sure every school has a Building Point of Contact and coordinate with them

Serve as the primary contact person for child welfare and case workers

Attend training and professional development opportunities to improve district implementation efforts

Facilitate the transfer of records and immediate enrollment


Facilitate data sharing with child welfare agencies, consistent with FERPA

Develop and coordinate local transportation procedures


Manage best-interest determinations and transportation cost disputes

Ensure that children in foster care are enrolled in, and regularly attending school

Foster Care Facts







In Washington State,

nearly 15% of youth in foster care will experience 3 or more placement changes

and lose up to 6 months of academic progress per move.

Your role: Building Point Person

- Run your KIT report at least 1x/month and distribute to approved and trained staff.
- Check in with KIT students/families frequently
- Update KIT office with any address changes, transportation needs
- Make referrals as needed to the FRC (after utilizing school and community)
- Make sure that posters and pamphlets are in places where students and parents can see, connect with your office for getting information in newsletters or other publications.
- Connect with office staff to reinforce best practices.






Train your building staff to:

- Be attentive to the stigma of living in unstable housing, and avoid using the word "homeless"
- Talk with the family/student privately
- Be conversational so that families do not feel interrogated
- Request permission to ask questions
- Share your commitment to problem-solving and sharing resources with the family
- Avoid unnecessary questions that may cause embarrassment
- Explain the reasons for your questions
- Show respect by conveying that you see the parents as the experts on their family
- Apply active listening skills that demonstrate compassion and respect
- Refer to your KIT Building Point Person

Strategic Initiative: Strengthen student wellness, engagement, and safety.

Most situations are supported on campus at the student's school, but sometimes there is a greater level of coordination needed. That is when the Building Point Person might refer a family to the Family Resource Center (or FRC).

At the FRC appointment parents and caregivers meet a knowledgeable guide, helping connect to support and services within EPS and our local community.

The FRC is also used as a hub, receiving and storing limited donations to be dispersed by school support staff as needed.

Strategic Initiative: Strengthen student wellness, engagement, and safety.

Who to refer:

- Families who are already identified as KIT eligible and who need more help navigating resources than what you can help with.
- Families who are losing housing and may need connected to prevention services.

How to refer: KIT/Foster building point person will assess the needs of the family and determine if they can provide support for the family's needs. If the family situation is eligible for McKinney-Vento or at risk of losing housing **AND** exceeds the support the school can provide, the building point person will complete a <u>Family Resource</u>

Practice Time!



Christine is 10 years old and in 5th grade. She stays with grandma and grandpa and sometimes her mom stays there too but Christine says they haven't seen her for a long time.

Christine's teacher is concerned with attendance and behaviors in class. Lately, Christine has been increasingly aggressive at school and cries a lot.

The grandparents shared they are also caring for a 4 year old and 8 month old sibling and are "strapped for cash" and do not receive any state support. They don't want CPS involved. They are scared that if they apply for benefits, mom will return and take the kids. They rent their home and missed a payment this last month. They don't know what to do.

A family living at the local shelter tells you they have only 2 weeks left and have nowhere to go. The youngest child is 4 and not in school. The older child is 12 and on an IEP. Mom has been trying to get a job but does not have childcare or a car.

Mom has also been working to get a parenting plan in place but says she can't afford legal costs right now.

Mom's goal is to stay in Everett as she attended the local schools there and wants her kids to remain there.







A mother of two students (one middle and one elementary) tells you that they lost their home as they fled an unsafe situation.

They are now living out of their car and have some stuff in a storage unit.

They are on waitlists for emergency shelter.

The kids are becoming smelly and mom does not have access to showers or laundry.

Poor behaviors escalate at school, and they are getting suspended.

When they can't go to school, they have nowhere to go, and temperatures are expected to drop below freezing this week.





Welcome to The Kids In Transition Program



The Everett Public Schools Kids in Transition (KIT) program implements the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act and the Foster Education

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act of 1987 provides support for homeless children and youth to continue their education without interruption or barriers. The definition for McKinney-Vento support is far more inclusive than what most people think

when they think of "homeless." Please review this information to understand more.

If your family is homeless, or if you are in a temporary living situation due to economic circumstances, your preschool-aged and school-aged children have certain rights or protections under federal law.

KIT supports students who qualify as either living in a foster care; or those who meet the definition of homeless under federal McKinney-Vento legislation. McKinney-Vento eligibility is based on the student's nighttime residence and is far more inclusive than what many consider homeless. Students who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence may qualify. KIT works to eliminate barriers to students' enrollment, academic success, and extra-curricular participation. We ensure eligible students have school supplies and may coordinate academic support, tutoring, or facilitate student participation in extended day or summer school classes. We help students participate in activities such as sports or clubs by paying the required fees. KIT may coordinate transportation for eligible students to maintain school stability, as long as the commute is feasible. Last year, Everett Public Schools supported over 1,100 eligible students at some time during the school year. 
