MULTIPLE CHOICE: "America's Dropout Crisis"

- 1. What is the meaning of the word *accomplish* on page 10, paragraph 4, of the selection? [IC14]
 - O A. Understand
 - O B. Change
 - O C. Extend
 - O D. Achieve

Correct Answer = D

Accomplish in the sentence can be replaced with achieve. The selection describes how to realize goals and to take next steps. The other word choices do not share this meaning.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "America's Dropout Crisis"

- 2. Which sentence from the selection is an opinion? [IT18]
 - O A. "Dropouts are more likely to have low-paying jobs or be unemployed."
 - O **B.** "The reality is, a high school diploma is a prize worth pursuing."
 - O C. "Some drop out because they're caught in a cycle of failure."
 - O **D.** "Another disturbing statistic is that non-graduates are 3.5 times more likely to be jailed than graduates."

Correct Answer = B

B is an opinion because this is the conclusion the author draws from the evidence presented in the text.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Living in the Success Zone"

- 3. After reading this selection, which generalization can the reader make about struggling readers? [IT20]
 - O A. A supportive environment can improve a student's reading ability.
 - O B. Involvement in sports can improve a student's grades and test scores.
 - O C. Developing an interest in reading can lead to early graduation.
 - O **D**. Colleges give preference to students who have overcome failure.

Correct Answer = A

On page 13 paragraph 6, the selection describes how Betty Lewing, the READ 180 teacher, encouraged Tabitha (and Jovorskie) to read and to stay in a reading support class. In that class, both students became more confident readers due to her support.

SHORT ANSWER: "Living in the Success Zone"

4. What are **two** similarities between Tabitha and Jovorskie? Include information from the selection in your answer. [LA06]

Possible Answers:

- Both graduates of Lufkin High School.
- Both became strong readers.
- Both overcame limitations and became reading success stories.
- Neither of them could remember a time when reading came easily.
- Both were enrolled in READ 180.
- Both wanted to quit READ 180 at first but then found something positive to focus on and stayed in the class.
- As they learned, they both were able to increase their confidence and academic ability.
- Both go on to college.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "The Pact"

5. What **four** pieces of advice would the author of "The Pact" give about pursuing a goal? Provide information from the selection in your answer. [LT10]

Possible Advice:

- Make a pact with friends to support each other, for example, "We tell them to pick trustworthy friends who have the same goal."
- Hang out with people who inspire you, for example, "... the wrong friends can lead you into to trouble."
- Stick to your goals no matter what, for example, "The pact gave us a reason to keep pushing when it would have been easier to just give up."
- Stay out of trouble, for example, "We provided one another with a kind of positive peer pressure,"
- Define your goals, for example, "But one of us, early in childhood, defined his goal of becoming a dentist."
- Communicate with your friends, for example, "We remind them to communicate openly, honestly, and often with each other."

 - O A. Latha will care for the tsunami victims at the hospital.
 - O B. Latha will take care of the children in the village.
 - O C. Latha will help in the tsunami relief effort.
 - O **D.** Latha will become a mother to her siblings.

Correct Answer = D

On page 38, paragraph 7, the author writes, "Now, I have resolved to care for my siblings and find a job."

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Relief + Recovery"

- 3. What is the purpose of the map on page 43? [IA15]
 - O A. The map shows the distance and time it took for the tsunami to reach cities and towns.
 - O B. The map shows the land masses located near the Indian Ocean.
 - O C. The map shows the location of the earthquake's epicenter and direction it travelled.
 - O **D**. The map shows the cities impacted by the tsunami.

Correct Answer = A

The purpose of the map is indicated by several text features. First of all, the map includes a key that highlights the cities and towns hit by the tsunami. Then, there is a compass that shows the direction of the tsunami waves. Lastly, the time is marked on the map describing the tsunami's travels.

SHORT ANSWER: "Terror and Tragedy"

4. Any of these titles could be another title for the selection. Choose the title you think best fits the selection.

Family Matters Survival The Day of the Wave

Provide **two** details from the selection to support your choice. [LC01]

Possible Titles and Details:

Family Matters

- At first, Latha runs to escape. She soon realizes she had to look for her family and went back to the police station.
- Latha is so worried about her family she can't stop crying.
- All of the family meets back at the house as soon as they can.
- As Latha says, "Now, I have resolved to care for my siblings and find a job."
- "... but with Mom gone, my family needs me."

Survival

- Latha runs from the ocean.
- The dad tried to save the family from drowning.
- One of Latha's brother survives and appears at the house.
- Another brother is rescued by a fisherman is brought home.
- Latha needs to get a job and takes care of her siblings.

The Day of the Wave

- At 8:45, Latha hears the neighbor scream and runs out to see what the crisis was.
- The waves rolled down the street, destroying huts, and then hit Latha.
- The police station was filled with terrified villagers.
- The beach was too dangerous to search.
- Most people's belongings were now swept away.
- 100's of villagers were dead as a result of the tsunami.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Relief + Recovery"

5. What problem do tsunami victims experience in the selection? What are **three** events that contribute to the resolution of the problem? Include information from the selection in your answer. [IA17]

Possible Problems and Resolutions:

Tsunami victims face death, injury, and loss of home and work.

- There's a massive global fundraising campaign.
- Former Presidents Bush and Clinton launched a campaign raising campaign. Eventually, \$7 billion is raised for the victims.
- Red Cross workers were activated and they searched for the missing, gave first aid, distributed food and water, and set up shelters.
- Habitat for Humanity helped to build and/or repair 4,000 home and started work on 2,000 more.
- A new system is finally underway to provide early warning for tsunamis.

Correct Answer = A

After many diseased cows are killed, Ayize feels responsible for not noticing that the cows were diseased. In addition, Ayize needs cows or money to pay the "bride price."

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Diamond Land"

- 2. On page 64, paragraph 8, of the story, why does the author include foreshadowing? [LT08]
 - O A. To make the reader believe that Ayize will have a better experience than others in the mines.
 - O B. To make the reader think that the soldiers are the true danger in the mines.
 - O C. To make the reader aware that Ayize or someone he knows will be hurt in the mines.
 - O **D.** To make the reader see that the truck driver cared about Ayize and his situation.

Correct Answer = C

When the truck driver says, "it's very risky in the mines," the reader then knows that Ayize or another important character will be at risk in the mines.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Nelson Mandela: In His Own Words"

- 3. Which word could the author have used on page 75, paragraph 15, instead of *oppression*? [LC04]
 - O A. Persistence
 - O B. Cruelty
 - O C. Extension
 - O D. Hopefulness

Correct Answer = B

Oppression in the speech means cruelty and domination of one group over another group, see paragraphs 3 through 6 and 11 through 15.

SHORT ANSWER: "Diamond Land"

4. What is the theme of the story "Diamond Land?" Support your answer with **one** example from the story. [LC01]

Possible Themes and Examples:

Exploitation of others

- Children have to work with little to no pay.
- Mine workers have to buy their food and water from the mining company.
- Zulus were exploited when the Dutch took over their land and pushed them into the homelands.

Survival

- When the cows die, Ayize takes another job in the mine.
- The mine workers have to find their own food and shelter outside of the mine area.
- Nkosi and other miners put themselves in dangerous situations to earn money. Nkosi hides diamonds in his hat and he chooses to take on a dangerous mining job for 1000 rand and dies.

Family

- Ayize decides to take a mining job to pay the bride price and to make up the cost of the cows to his family.
- Ayize describes the Zulu ways to his younger brother, taking on the father-like role.
- At the end of the story, Ayize marries and becomes a rancher, just like his father.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Diamond Land"

5. What **four** pieces of advice would Ayize give about working in the mines? Provide information from the story in your answer. [LT10]

Possible Advice:

- Be very careful where you find shelter. The truck driver, on page 64, directs Aziye where to stay.
- Be very careful where you choose to find mining work. The priest, on page 63, paragraph 26, says that some mining camps are better than others.
- Be very careful when you are offered work for a very large sum of money. The bosses, on pages 69 and 70, offered 1000 rand for miners to work in a pit. Nkosi took them up on the offer and died.
- Be very observant about your life on the farm. When farming falls apart, the only other work may be to work in the dangerous mines.
- Be very careful about taking chances when working at a mine. Nkosi had to go to extreme lengths to hide the pink diamonds in his mouth and his hat.
- Be very careful that you are not taken advantage of when finding a place to live while working at the mines. Nkosi asked Ayize for 100 rand to share a shelter, but Ayize bargains the price down to 50 rand.

Correct Answer = D

Both pathologists and forensic biologists analyze forensic evidence, see page 90, paragraph 1. The rest of the selection describes the differences between the forensic evidence examined by pathologists, toxicologists, and forensic biologists.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Body of Evidence"

- 2. What is the purpose of the time line at the bottom of pages 92, 93, and 94? [IA15]
 - O A. The time line shows how pathologists determine the time of death.
 - O B. The time line shows the steps leading to Jane's arrest.
 - O C. The time line shows the events leading up to the missing person's report.
 - O D. The time line shows that Jane was convicted of first-degree murder.

Correct Answer = B

The time line identifies the key events that occur over the course of the selection, ultimately leading to Jane's arrest (on the time line) and first-degree murder conviction (in the text).

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "DNA Analysis: The Key to Solving Crimes"

- 3. Based on the information in the selection, what is the most important concept the author presents? [IT19]
 - O A. DNA analysis is an accurate way to identify people involved in a crime.
 - O B. DNA analysis allows forensic scientists to observe and study cell patterns.
 - O C. DNA analysis provides key genetic information about parents and children.
 - O D. DNA analysis is stored in a nationwide comprehensive computer database.

Correct Answer = A

The selection describes how DNA analysis is used to solve crimes.

SHORT ANSWER: "DNA Analysis: The Key to Solving Crimes"

4. Write a summary of the process of collecting and identifying DNA. Include **three** important ideas from the selection in your summary. [IC12]

Possible Important Ideas:

- At the crime scene, investigators collect samples of bodily fluids on cotton swabs.
- The samples are stored in a sterilized tube with a preservative and chilled.
- Forensic scientists then extract the DNA from the sample.
- Forensic scientists use special chemicals to repeat the DNA patterns.
- Forensic scientists mark each repeated protein pattern with dye.
- The sample is placed in a tube and a sensor reads the patterns. The data is sent to a computer.
- The computer provides a DNA profile.
- The crime scene profile is compared to a suspect's profile.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Body of Evidence"

5. What is the author's purpose for writing the selection? Provide **three** details from the selection to support your answer. [IT18]

Possible Purposes and Details:

To inform the reader of the process to convict Jane of Bob's murder.

To inform the reader of the process about how investigators solve a murder mystery. To demonstrate to the reader that it is difficult to commit murder and get away with it.

- Bob was reported missing.
- Bob's body was found and positively identified.
- Pathologists identified the time of death.
- Pathologists perform a detailed autopsy.
- Jane was interviewed and her stories were called into question.
- The pathologists return to Bob's body to find more clues to help investigators convict Jane.

 - O B. Teens accept bullying as a way to interact with each other.
 - O C. Teens can go undetected and not be identified as the bully.
 - O D. Teens make friends by sticking together and harassing others.

Correct Answer = C

According to page 117, paragraphs 6 through 8, the selection describes how teens bully because they can remain anonymous.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Trouble at Your Fingertips"

- 3. Which sentence summarizes the selection? [IC12]
 - O A. Students call parents and friends to find information, soon overuse their phone minutes, and are afraid to disconnect.
 - O **B.** Students multitask while on the computer, send text messages during class, and surf the internet or watch TV while studying.
 - O C. Students are easily frustrated when they can't get an answer right away, have short attention spans, and are unable to stay on task.
 - O **D**. Students spend a lot of time online, soon are unable to think for themselves, and then lose their perspective on school.

Correct Answer = D

D is the correct answer because it includes important aspects from the beginning, middle, and end of the selection.

SHORT ANSWER: "Cyberbullies" and "Trouble at Your Fingertips"

4. The author of the selection "Trouble at Your Fingertips" states, "Recently, a survey of more than 1,000 students ages 12 to 17 revealed the negative aspects of teens' love of technology." Provide **two** examples from the selection "Cyberbullies" that show the negative aspects of teens' love technology. [IA16]

Possible Answers:

- They impersonate other teens online and send phony messages to friends and classmates.
- They forward private e-mails and embarrassing e-mails to others.
- They spread gossip through e-mail and IM.
- They manipulate friends into fighting with each other through e-mail and IM.
- They can remain anonymous when cyberbullying.
- Surveys have shown the impact on teens' love of technology, see page 117, paragraph 4.
- Bullies called griefers hassle other players.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Trouble at Your Fingertips"

5. What is the author's purpose for writing the selection? Provide **three** details from the selection to support your answer. [IT18]

Possible Purposes and Details:

To inform the reader of how technology is affecting teens' lives.

To persuade the reader to change their use of technology.

- "Forty percent of students surveyed say they stay logged onto the Internet for a week or more at a time."
- "Sixty-two percent said they can't live without technology for more than a few days."
- "One in four said they hate to be disconnected for even one minute."
- These teens face harsh consequences: brief attentions spans, limited patience, and difficulty thinking independently.
- "Fifty-two percent of survey respondents say they've gone over their cell phone's minute plans."
- Technology use negatively affects their school performance.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "To Build a Fire"

- 2. How are the man and the dog in the selection similar? [LA06]
 - O A. Both knew to follow one another.
 - O B. Both recognized they needed a fire to stay warm.
 - O C. Both were aware of the dangerous temperatures.
 - O **D.** Both fell into the traps of hidden pools.

Correct Answer = B

The man and the dog both knew they needed to be warm. The man tries to build a fire, whereas the dog follows the man in search of fire.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: from "Staying Alive"

- 3. Which statement is the most important conclusion the reader can draw from the selection? [LT09]
 - O A. Information increases your chances of survival.
 - O B. It's easy to learn from life's challenges.
 - O C. Help can be found without much time or effort.
 - O **D**. Ignoring certain signals can lead to safety.

Correct Answer = A

Each stanza gives advice or information about what to do when you're in the wilderness.

SHORT ANSWER: "To Build a Fire"

4. The author of the story states, "It did not lead him (the man) to think about how vulnerable he was in this frozen wilderness." Do you agree with his statement? Support your answer with **two** details from the story. [LT08]

Possible Answers:

Yes, I agree.

- The man falls in the hidden pools.
- The man doesn't recognize how cold it really is.
- The man lets his face, hands, and toes become frozen.
- The man builds a fire under a snow-covered spruce tree.
- The man uses up all of his matches.
- The man tries to kill the dog in order to survive.
- The man dies.

No, I don't agree.

- The man had clothes and food.
- The man knew to keep the food next to his skin.
- The man had matches and moss to start a fire.
- The man had heard advice from more experienced men.
- The man had a dog.
- The man had a direction toward the camp he was going to.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "To Build a Fire"

5. What problem does the man experience? What are **three** steps he takes to solve this problem? Include information from the story in your answer. [LA05]

Possible Problems and Details:

The man travels alone to scout out the possibility of getting out logs in the spring. The man doesn't pay attention to the clues that the frozen wilderness gives him. The man is more concerned about getting to the camp than about his own safety.

- The man builds a fire and eats.
- The man strikes his hands against his legs to stay warm.
- The man tries to build a second fire.
- The man tries to keep his head and remain calm.
- The man uses the heels of his hands when his fingers didn't work.
- The man tries to hold a match with his teeth and scratched the match on his leg.
- The man plans to kill the dog to stay warm.
- The man tries to run to camp.
- The man decides he is going to die with dignity.

Correct Answer = B

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Life in the Ocean Zones"

- 3. What is the main difference between the sunlit zones and the twilight zones in the ocean? [IA16]
 - O A. Fish adapt to their environment in the twilight zone.
 - O B. Fish change their colors to survive in the twilight zone.
 - O C. Bioluminescent fish live in the sunlit zone.
 - O **D**. Photosynthesis occurs in the sunlit zone.

Correct Answer = D

Only in the sunlit zone does photosynthesis occur.

SHORT ANSWER: "Life in the Ocean Zones"

4. Explain why sea creatures must use adaptation to survive in the midnight zone. Include **two** details from the selection in your answer. [IA17]

Possible Answers:

- They have to adapt to the extreme cold by living next to toxic hydrothermal vents.
- They have to adapt to the extreme pressure of the ocean.
- They have bacteria in their bodies that allows them to turn the chemicals released from the vents into food.
- Without light, some animals are bioluminescent.
- They adapt, like the gulper eel, to eat larger animals than themselves.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Dijanna Figueroa: Sea Scientist"

5. Is Dijanna Figueroa's decision to become a movie star a good idea? Provide **four** details from the selection to support your answer. [IT19]

Possible Answers and Details:

Yes, it's a good idea.

- She gains personal satisfaction by becoming a celebrity.
- She gets to experience going to the bottom of the ocean in a submersible.
- She provided accurate information to the movie.
- She became an ambassador for science.
- Her life changed.

No, it's not a good idea.

- By traveling to the bottom of the ocean in a submersible, she could have put herself in danger.
- She could have become distracted from her real work, because of reporters and others who recognize her.
- The movie took time away from her work as a scientist.
- She was in danger when she observed the 650 degree vents.
- She has no previous experience being in a film.

Due to the last sentence on page 192, paragraph 3, the reader can infer that U.S. companies would want to hire employees in Latin America because the work can be completed quickly and for less money.

MULTIPLE CHOICE: "Outsource It"

- 2. Which sentence summarizes the selection? [IC12]
 - O A. Since jobs can be handled more cheaply outside the U.S., more companies are contracting from other countries.
 - O **B.** Because there are a limited variety of businesses in foreign countries, outsourcing possibilities are endless.
 - O **C.** Based on data from surveys, businesses in the U.S. show they outsource the majority of jobs in information technology.
 - O **D.** Although foreign workers are underpaid and overworked, they continue to work for U.S. companies.

Correct Answer = A

Throughout the article there are descriptions of how U.S. businesses outsource because it's cheaper than hiring U.S. workers.

 - O A. Both countries maintain efficient, well-organized factories.
 - O B. Both countries stress the importance of a good education.

Correct Answer = B

On page 201, paragraph 6, the article states, "Like India, China emphasizes education."

SHORT ANSWER: "Exploding Economies"

4. Explain **two** ways that the editorial cartoon on page 201 helps you understand the selection. Include information from the editorial cartoon in your answer. [IA15]

Possible Answers and Details:

Chinese products are found everywhere. The graduate notices that even his cap is made in China. This helps the reader understand these parts of the article:

- China now has sixth largest economy, poised to take over the U.S. as number one.
- China has 1.5 billion people in its workforce the world's largest.
- Because of its reliable workforce and its ability to deliver goods cheaply, China has become the world's factory floor.

China emphasizes education. Ironically, as the U.S. student is graduating, he notices his cap is made in China. This helps the reader understand these parts of the article:

- 17 million post-secondary students.
- In 2004, 325,000 engineers graduated in China, five times the number in the U.S.

EXTENDED RESPONSE: "Outsource It"

5. Is outsourcing a good idea? Provide **four** details from the selection to support your answer. [IT19]

Possible Answers and Details:

Yes, it's a good idea.

- If you're having trouble with school subjects, you can get an online tutor.
- If you don't want to finish your online game, you can hire a kid to play the game for you.
- Outsourcing provides cheap labor.
- Outsourcing gives foreign countries to enter the U.S. market.
- In 2006, India announced plans to increase its workforce by 50 percent.

No, it's not a good idea.

- 160,000 people in Bangalore, India, provide services to the U.S., which means 160,000 fewer jobs for American workers.
- 70 percent of U.S. technology companies outsource jobs.
- Indian and Chinese workers are not paid as well as U.S. workers.
- Outsourcing is a trend that might not continue.

According to the selection, what are **two** differences between life in the U.S. and life in Mexico? Provide information from the selection in your answer. [LA06]

Possible Answers:

Similarities

- They could make a living in both the U.S. and Mexico.
- There was shelter to be found in both the U.S. and Mexico.
- At one point, the entire family could live either in the U.S. or Mexico.
- They experience fear in both places. In Mexico, they feared poverty and, in the U.S., they feared deportation.

Differences

- In Mexico, they lived in dry, barren hills in poverty. In the U.S., they lived in army barracks.
- For ten years in the U.S., the family feared being deported back to Mexico. In Mexico, the family was safe from the law.
- In the U.S. in Santa Maria, there were schools. There were no schools in the family's town in Mexico.
- Roberto was able to get a job outside of the fields in the U.S. and he wouldn't have had that opportunity in Mexico.
- In the U.S., the family is separated, with the two boys being in the States and the rest of the family in Mexico.
