



Dr. Squito received his Ph.D. in Entomology from SMDTM University in 1993; his M.A. in Entomology from Terrmight University in 1989, and his B.A. in Biology from Fyrfli University in 1986.

A Brief Biography

Dr. Maurice (Moe) Squito has studied insects ever since he can remember. Some of his earliest memories are of watching spiders spin webs and observing the termites that delighted in chewing the paneling in his bedroom.

His favorite nursery rhymes were the *Eensy-Weensy Spider* and *Ladybug*, *Ladybug Fly Away Home*, which he recited with relish when he was less than three years old. His literary interests expanded as he grew older. At five he thrilled to the adventures of "Jim" Cricket in <u>Pinocchio</u>, and sobbed when Charlotte died at the end of <u>Charlotte's Web</u>,



when he turned nine. Moe was a very sensitive child and highly imaginative. He wondered whether the crickets and grasshoppers played symphonies just for him. Often, he would lay awake at night listening to the natural concerts that swelled beneath his bedroom window.



Wooly Mammoths

A mammoth was a type of elephant that lived during the Ice Ages. The Ice Ages were a times when much of the Earth was covered with snow and ice. It was very hard to live during the Ice Ages because the climate world-wide was much colder than it is today. Mammoths were extremely well-adapted to live in this type of climate.

Mammoths had long tusks which were curled up at the ends. They used their tusks to scrape the snow off grass and plants so they could eat them. The



tusks were also used for protection from predators, such as the smilodon, or saber cat.

Mammoths had long, shaggy hair which helped keep them warm. They had a double coat of hair. The long, shaggy hair of the outer coat kept the cold off of the mammoth's body. The inner coat, which was made of hollow hairs, helped keep the mammoth's body heat in.

Mammoths had a hump between their shoulders in which fat was stored. When mammoths couldn't find food to eat, their bodies would use up the fat which was stored in the hump. This was an important adaptation in a land which was often covered by ice and snow.
