## Madison Elementary benefits from Farmers Insurance program

In addition to \$2,500 grants, six Dream Big Teacher Challenge grants of \$100,000 each will be awarded to help support innovative educational programs in communities across the country. Teachers can enter to win the \$100,000 grant before the end of June. The 15 finalists will be announced in September and the public can vote for their favorite teacher in October. Winners of the <a href="Dream Big Teacher Challenge">Dream Big Teacher Challenge</a> will be announced in December.

Madison Elementary is the learning home for approximately 450 students in kindergarten through fifth-grade. "More than seven out of ten (73%) of our students qualify for free and reduced-priced lunches," explains Interim Principal David ONeil. "With this generous gift from Farmers, we are able to do more to provide materials for our students who may not have access to high quality learning materials and experiences outside of school. I'm always amazed at the power of community partnerships and the way our teachers seek and secure resources for students!"
