


Student enrollment from 1950-2014

Without more space for elementary students by 2022,

- 13 of our 17 elementary schools will be over capacity by 809 students
- Elementary students will be using 60 portables
- 4 north area elementary schools will have space for only 236 students – the average elementary school is built for 550





More students

Without more space for high school students by 2022,

- Two of our four high schools will be over capacity by a total of 460
- High school students will be using 29 portables (23 at Jackson High)
- Everett High and Sequoia will have space for only 300





Technology needs




