## **Myth Buster**

**MYTH:** Taking the easiest courses the high school offers will boost your GPA and help you get into college.

#### **REALITY:**

College admissions officers understand the difference between an A in an easy class and a B in a more challenging class.

The most rigorous or challenging courses offered in a typical high school are honors and Advanced Placement or AP classes. In general, it is better to take advanced courses and work hard than take easy classes and put in little effort.

There is a **big difference** between meeting high school graduation requirements and taking classes that colleges expect to see on your transcript. Be sure to check out the colleges in Naviance that you are considering and check the requirements.
