From Melanie Curtice: Molly:

You have asked whether it is appropriate to have the Everett School Employee Benefit Trust ("Trust") pay for a gift for a retiring Trustee.

I've reviewed the Trust Document and note that it allows only for the payment of benefits (Section 1.1) and for the reimbursement of Trustee expenses Section 4.3).

The Trustee expenses provision states:

"Expenses: Trustees shall be reimbursed from the Fund for expenses reasonably incurred but shall not be entitled to compensation for the performance of their duties as Trustees."

While payment for a gift is arguably not compensation for performance, it is payment for something other than benefits and the reimbursement of reasonable expenses and not allowed under the terms of the Trust.
