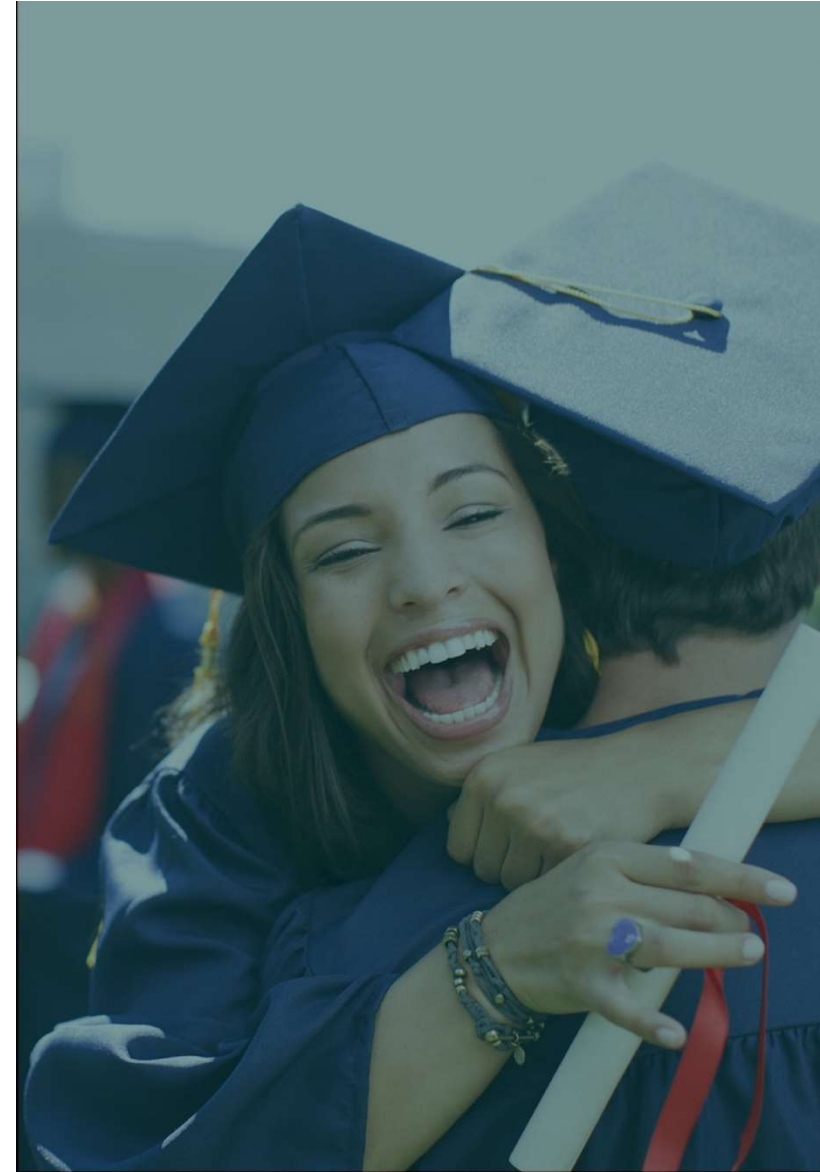
What should a student experience in the weeks leading up to course selection?

Example:

- 3 weeks out: Family receives a congratulations letter with information on events and ways to learn more/engage with school. Course selection website goes live with video testimonials/course descriptions from students and staff
- 2 weeks out: Trusted Adult Conversations, First-time AP Night
- 1 week out: AP Fair and Subject area interest meetings

What do Trusted Adults need to know to confidently engage in encouraging conversations?

- *Example: List of available AP, dual credit, and other advanced options, talking points on the programs and working through common student barriers, clear next steps for students, easy way to track conversations.*



→ Outreach Planning

Top 3 Outreach Strategies

1

Large Group Meetings

These can range from grade level assemblies to small groups or rallies for only those students on outreach lists or more intimate groups.

2

1:1 Conversations Between Trusted Adults and Students

Individualized conversations that often occur after larger group meetings to address remaining concerns and re-state belief that the student can be successful.

3

Family Engagement

Parent letters, phone calls, and/or parent nights providing family with information around advanced courses, and encouraging them to have conversations with their students.

How might your school use the following filters?

Student Subject Interest

Departments can outreach to students based on their subject area interest. For example, having a lunchtime Science “Chat and Chew” with current AP students

Students with Academic Goals Past High School, but Feel Unprepared or They Wouldn’t Belong

Counselors and community-based organizations can prioritize these students for fairs, college visits, and other career exploration options

AP Students Interested in Organizing Peer Recruitment, Mentoring, and/or Support Groups

Schools can provide citizenship opportunities for students to build a legacy of belonging at their school

Practice Filtering, Grouping, and Downloading from **Data Narrative**

Save your caseload of students and download Student Insight Cards as a PDF

- Click “All Students” view
- Click “Columns and Filters”
- Filter by Counselor Last Name
- Save As
- Check “My views” to find the list
- Click Download to start report
- After a few seconds, click the notification bell in the top right to retrieve the report

Search for a specific student

- Open your caseload from “My Views”
- Click “Columns and Filters”
- Filter by Last Name

To better view a card, try zooming out on your browser and turning off the “Columns and Filters

Practice Filtering, Grouping, and Downloading from **Data Narrative**

Group your students by subject interest

- Open your caseload from “My Views”
- Click “Columns and Filters”
- Under “Group by”, search for Subject Interest (middle school) or Curriculum Program Interest (high school)
- Click Download to run the report
- Retrieve a zip folder of Student Insight Cards organized by subject interest

How many of your students did not list a Trusted Adult

- Open your caseload from “My Views”
- Click “Columns and Filters”
- Search for “Trusted Advisor”
- Search for “No one”
- Save view for reference

Switch to the Data Explorer tool to download an Excel file of any reports or shared views.
