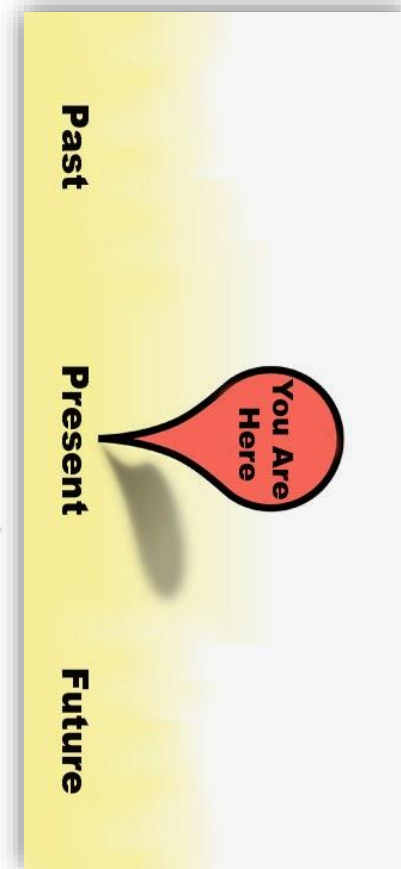

# Education & Training Cost \$\$

After you graduate high school any class/training course you take will cost money!

Just to attend a class at college and learn the content, you will pay **tuition and/or fees**. (This doesn't take into consideration any living expenses.)

Type of College	Average Published Yearly Tuition and Fees
Public Two-Year College (in-district students)   	\$3,440
Public Four-Year College (in-state students)   	\$9,410
Public Four-Year College (out-of-state students) 	\$23,890
Private Four-Year College   	\$32,410

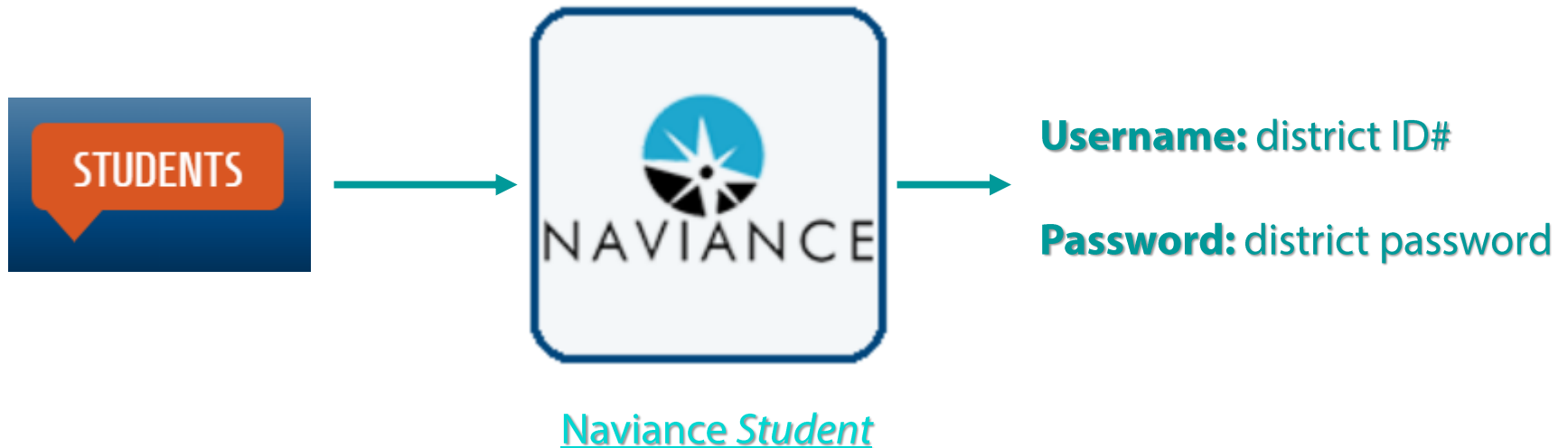

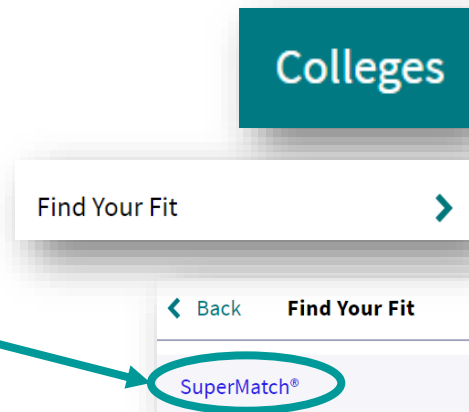

# What do These Terms Mean?

Term	Definition
Community College	<b><u>Two year Associate Degree</u></b> programs in academic, scientific, and technical fields.
Technical/Trade College	One to <b><u>two year programs</u></b> providing training for skilled, trade and high tech workers preparing for a career in the high tech industry.
Associate Degree	An <b><u>two year</u></b> degree earned for an undergraduate course of study.
University	<b><u>Four year programs</u></b> that offer the widest variety of class subjects and levels. Students can earn Bachelor's Degree and advanced degrees in specialized fields.
Bachelor's Degree	An academic degree earned for an undergraduate course of study that normally requires <b><u>three to five years</u></b> of coursework.
Masters Degree	An academic degree earned <b><u>after</u></b> a Bachelor's Degree in a specific field of study or profession.
Doctorate (PhD)	The highest level of academic degree and can be earned in almost any subject area not just medical fields.
Tuition	The <b><u>money you pay</u></b> to take classes in college. In state is less expensive than out of state.
Education and Training	<b><u>Cost of taking courses</u></b> to be trained in a specific area and vary by type.

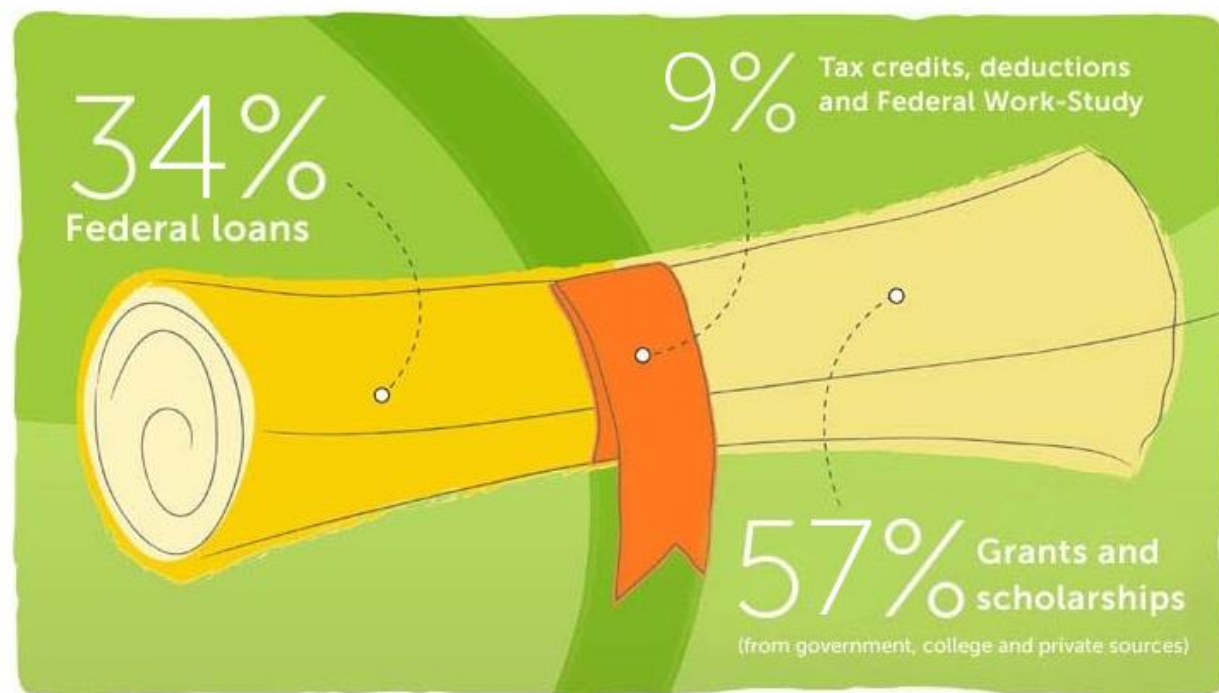
# Money, Money, Money!

**Financial aid** is money that the government and other organizations give or lend to you to pay for college.

To qualify for financial aid, you have to apply.

Students who can't afford the full cost of college are able to earn their degrees with financial aid.

## Financial Aid Can Help You Afford College

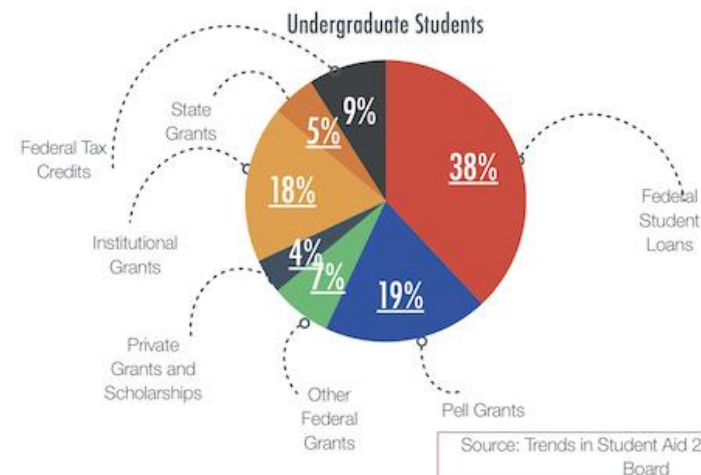


# Where Does it Come From?

**Financial aid comes from these sources:**

- **Federal government** (the largest source)
- **State governments**
- **Colleges and universities**
- **Private organizations**, such as companies, clubs and religious organizations
- **Banks and lending companies**

# Financial Aid Types

**Scholarships** are called **gift aid** because they **do not** have to be paid back.

A **loan** is when you borrow money from a bank that you **do** pay back over time.



**Grants** are called **gift aid** because they **do not** have to be paid back.

The **Federal Work-Study Program** offers paid part-time jobs to help students pay for college costs.

# Are You a College Bound Scholar?

The College Bound Scholarship is an early commitment of state financial aid to eligible students who...

- Sign up in 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> grade
- Fulfill the College Bound pledge

## What do I get with the scholarship?

Once you file the FAFSA as a **senior** the scholarship will pay the average tuition cost at a public college plus some fees and a small book allowance.

## Where can I use it?

- Public community and technical colleges
- Public four-year colleges and universities
- Independent colleges and universities
- Private career colleges
