## Examples: One cause producing one effect

- 1. Some fish can be described as doing the work of dentists, because they clean fungi and bacteria from the teeth of larger fish.
- 2. Because the wind carries smog to remote areas, some days the smog in the Arctic can rival that of Los Angeles.
- 3. The North Pole has 24 hours of daylight on the first day of the summer, because the sun never drops below the horizon on that day.
- 4. Because the wetland areas soak up rainwater like a sponge, they provide water storage and flood protection.
- 5. The Everglades was dammed and drained; consequently, wildlife was devastated.
