#### Thumbs up/thumbs down

#### Truancy is an early warning sign for school failure

75% of truant students will eventually drop out of school.



That means if these four friends are all truant, only one of them will stay in school long enough to graduate.



## Truancy is also a warning sign for criminal involvement





Over 50% of people in San Francisco's jail are "functionally illiterate." That means they have

75% of people in prison were habitual truants—they skipped school consistently and frequently.

## If students stay in school, it is safer for them and for the community in general



# All children between the ages of 6 and 18 are required BY LAW to attend school.

If you miss school without your parent's permission, you are breaking the law! If you do it repeatedly, you are considered "habitually truant."

## Did you know? If you're late to school a lot, you are also at risk of being truant

Every time you are **more than 30 minutes late** for school, that is counted as a tardy. After three tardies, you are considered to be truant.

Habitually truant students and their parents can be prosecuted. They are breaking the law.



#### Parents of habitual truants face serious consequences

#### First, the Education Code fines parents:

1 <sup>st</sup> instance	\$100 per child
2 <sup>nd</sup> instance	\$250 per child
3 <sup>rd</sup> instance	\$500 per child

If truancy continues, it is considered a misdemeanor. Parents may face:

- A fine up to \$2,500
- Up to one year in jail



#### The D.A.'s Office prosecutes parents of habitual truants

Parents who repeatedly demonstrate a failure to get their children to school—or parents who fail to work with SFUSD staff to solve the problem—will be prosecuted by the District Attorney's Office. They will have to appear in court.



#### **Your Options in Truancy Court**

You have been called to court today for a violation of Education Code § 48293, an infraction. When you appear in front of the judge, you will be presented with three options. Please take time to consider your decision and feel free to ask for clarification from the District Attorney, your caseworker, or the presiding judge.

	The school district and city social services will provide assistance to help your child attend and succeed in school.		<ul> <li>You have the right to an attorney, but none will be provided for you by the court.</li> <li>At the end of the trial, the judge will rule on your case.</li> </ul>
END RESULT	If your child attends school regularly for the next semester, you will not pay any fine and CHARGES WILL BE DROPPED. If not, you must pay a \$100 FINE for each truant child and the infraction will be reflected in your criminal record. If found guilty, you must pay a \$100 FINE for each truant child and the infraction will be reflected in your criminal record.  If found not guilty, your case will be dismissed.

Failure to pay any fine ordered by the court may result in a charge of contempt and a warrant for your arrest.

PLEASE NOTE: Any parent found guilty of a first truancy offense who is re-referred to the District Attorney may be charged under Penal Code § 272, a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$2,500 fine.

## Education Code

Pay a fine of up to \$100

Complete 20–40 hours of community service

#### Vehicle Code

Driver's license can be suspended/delayed up to 1 year.

Repeat offenders' licenses can be suspended/delayed for additional years.

#### Students will also have to appear in court



- The same judge will hear parent and student cases, so the judge will be familiar with each student's individual circumstances.
- Court appointments will be arranged so students don't miss more school.
- Students must demonstrate a willingness to improve their attendance and involvement in school.
